## School of Professional Studies (SPS) Trainings and Workshops

You might have heard about them because of the 3-week CUNY-sponsored <u>program</u> about online and hybrid course instruction offered to faculty during the summer. They have more workshops and trainings available on their site, such as how to use Ensemble Video or screencast. Check out their <u>calendar</u> for upcoming events.

#### **Blackboard's Youtube Channel**

Blackboard's official Youtube channel features how-to videos on different aspects of the platform such as exams, blogs, and conducting virtual lessons. The channel also has

videos for students, which demonstrate how to navigate the Blackboard class page from the student's view.

## **Teaching Online: English Fall 2020 (Baruch College)**

Baruch College has put together a list of resources geared towards English Faculty (but useful for all!) on a variety of topics. Their interactive platforms tutorial is a must if you are a visual learner/thinker, and their tips on assignments and grading will make your life easier.
