# **Barcodes and ID**

## Cards

The College has issued new ID cards for all York College students, faculty, and staff. The new ID cards have a Library barcode built in to it.

Unfortunately, occasionally the barcodes do not work with the Library system.

Therefore, it is essential that the new ID card's barcode be validated by a member of the Library staff at the Circulation

desk as soon as it is issued. The validation is quick and necessary. A new ID card with a new barcode can be produced by the Public Safety staff issuing ID cards. The replacement card is free if it is necessitated by a faulty barcode.

If the barcode is faulty, the user
will not be able to do many Library
related things, including taking out
books, using reserve materials, and using
the reference databases on the World
Wide Web made available by CUNY

and York. Thus, it is essential that the barcode be checked immediately upon issuance of the ID card.

Queens High School for the Sciences at York College

It has been a busy autumn. In September, 2004, School Media
Specialist Christina Miller oriented freshmen to the library, its resources,
CUNY+ and databases...

Several book displays were created in the Fall 2004 semester. The Banned Books display coincided with Banned Books Week, 9/25-10/2; ALEX Award selections were displayed in October; a display to celebrate Jewish Book Month was created in November; and international award-winning books were displayed in December. The most recent display is entitles "Escape the weather with a b good book!"

This year, 19 Queens High
School for the Sciences students are
Junior Fellows of the New York
Academy of Medicine. Ms. Miller and
Ms. Gretchen Hazlin, of the New York
Academy of Medicine, will host five
workshops in the Spring semester of
2005 for the Junior Fellows in the
Library's Information Literacy Room.
Students will learn to select a topic,

evaluate books, locate periodicals, search online databases and use the Internet for research.

Faculty continue to utilize Library resources. Mr. Gerardi's music classes used the library to research musical periods, timelines and composers in a two-session library workshop in October, 2004. Ms. Miller prepared a library resource guide for French teacher, Maureen Owens, to help students learn about French-speaking countries. Ms. Keeley's English students used the library to find information for their assignment for Hispanic Heritage Month. Students researched the contributions of Hispanic people to the sciences, arts, literature and music, utilizing at least five resources, including a book, magazine, website, encyclopedia and newspaper. Ms. Gibson brought her science classes to the library to work on their research assignments.

Students from the Queens High
School for the Sciences will visit the
92<sup>nd</sup> St. Y on January 11th for a pizza
party, interviews with authors Yann
Martel and Han Ong, and book readings
by the authors.
