DIRECTOR'S NOTES

Of all the characters in Shakespeare's plays, *Hamlet* is the most controversial. Each new generation of readers wonders: Is Hamlet really mad? Why doesn't he kill Claudius immediately? What is his relationship with his mother, with Ophelia, with the other characters?

In this brief glance at the play, I wanted to emphasize only three aspects of Hamlet's character:

His isolation—shown here in three soliloquies and the repetition of the "To be or not to be" scene.

His betrayal by Ophelia and the subsequent murder of her father, Polonius.

Finally, his divided self —shown by two Hamlets, one Hispanic and one American, culminating in the metaphoric duel between the two.

For those who have never read Hamlet, the parody of the Player's Scene at the beginning of this piece gives the plot.
