York Students Perform Prose, Poetry, and Songs From Their Ethnic Roots



NOTES ON CALLALOO

The current production of *Callaloo* was inspired by a picture in the new National Geographic Atlas of the World. A composite satellite picture of cloudless earth, created over a year from three satellites' photographs, depicts human settlements in white. The most white reflects the largest concentrations of the earth's six billion plus population. In this production, seven performers, dressed in white, figuratively step out of these concentrations to tell their family stories, a mere grain of sand in terms of the whole, but so important to these individuals. Within these stories, projected family photographs record fleeting moments of time.

Performers are enrolled for credit in Theatre Arts 215-19, Studies in Theatre Practice. Research of family history and appropriate literature is an important part of the preparation of *Callaloo*. Sometimes students find out things about their families they didn't know; almost always they discover unfamiliar literature.

I have developed and directed nine separate theatre events entitled Callaloo: York
Theatre Students Read Literature From Their Ethnic Backgrounds. The name Callaloo comes
from a plant that grows in the Caribbean and a stew of which that plant is an ingredient. To use
this name as the title of the performance piece (No one knew there would be another one.) was
suggested by Christopher Diaz and Roger Drysdale, Trinidadians, who appeared on the first
Callaloo. Callaloo 1 was presented March 1989, in an Academic Core lecture hall; Callaloo 2
opened the new theatre.

Thornton Wilder once defined theatre as "one of the most immediate ways a human being can show another human being what it means to be a human being." This definition is especially applicable to *Callaloo*. All the literature and family stories point to diversity, yet at the same time reveal what we have in common, "what it means to be a human being."

Previous Callaloo performers are listed elsewhere in this program.



FACULTY OF YORK COLLEGE THEATRE

James Como (Chairman of the Performing and Fine Arts Department, Professor of Speech Communication) came to York in 1968, when he founded the speech discipline. He chaired the Department of Performing and Fine Arts for 14 years. He holds a Ph.D. degree in Language, Literature and Communication from Columbia University. At York, he has appeared in The Madwoman of Chaillot (directed by Barbara Nickolich). His newest book is Branches to Heaven: The Geniuses of C.S. Lewis.

Timothy J. Amrhein (Assistant Professor of Theatre Design) holds an MFA from Wayne State University. He has designed sets for various productions throughout the United States, and most recently: The New York City Premier of The Full Monty (The Gallery Players), My Favorite Year and Princess Ida (The Village Light Opera Group) and Much Ado About Nothing and Romeo and Juliet (Princeton Rep Shakespeare Festival). He has recently received the Best Scenic Design award from the NJ Star Ledger for his production of The Merry Wives of Windsor and the Detroit Free Press's Theatre Excellence Award for Saturday, Sunday, Monday and Scapin. He is a member of United Scenic Artists (USA) Local 829 and the United States Institute of Theatre Technology (USITT).

Barbara Nickolich (Professor of Theatre) received her formal theatre training from Wheaton College, Northwestern University and New York University. In addition, she has been a student of Bobby Troka, voice coach, in New York City. She has appeared as a performer and director with the CUNY Readers Theatre. She developed a one-woman show, American Counterpoint, which she performed in Munich, Germany, Nashville and New York City. Most of her work has been as a director of legitimate theatre in university settings. Antigone, Tartuffe, Six Plays by Dario Fo, Callallo 7, The Miser, Camino Real, The Imaginary Invalid, Galileo, Callaloo 8, and A Servant of Two Masters have been her most recent productions.
