

Theatre Arts practica courses currently include TA215-19.

*All SpeechComm/TA majors must take SPCH 101 as a Prereq for completion of the Major. Majors in Speech Communication/Theatre Arts must fulfill their General Education Requirements in a discipline other than their major.



James Como (Professor of Speech Communication) came to York in 1968, when he founded the speech discipline. He chaired the Department of Performing and Fine Arts for 15 years. He holds a Ph.D. degree in Language, Literature and Communication from Columbia University. At York, he has appeared in The Madwoman of Chaillot (directed by Barbara Nickolich). His newest book is Branches to Heaven: The Geniuses of C.S. Lewis.

Timothy J. Amrhein (Assistant Professor of Theatre Design) holds an MFA from Wayne State University. He has designed sets and costumes for various productions throughout the United States, and most recently: Twelfth Night, and The Merry Widow. Some of Mr. Amrhein's past work includes the first New York City revival of The Full Monty, The Fantasticks, and Yeoman of The Guard. He has designed at the Princeton Rep Shakespeare Festival, The River Rep Theatre, The Wings Theatre, and Montclair State University. Mr. Amrhein has also designed for The Second City Comedy Group; Carnegie Mellon University; the University of Pittsburgh, and the California Repertory Theatre. He has received the Best Scenic Design award from the NJ Star Ledger for his production of The Merry Wives of Windsor and the Detroit Free Press's Theatre Excellence Award for Saturday, Sunday, Monday and Scapin. Mr. Amrhein is a member of United Scenic Artists (USA) Local 829 and the United States Institute of Theatre Technology (USITT).

Bob Barnes (CLT, Theatre Technical Director) spent many years touring throughout Europe and the United States, working with companies such as the Atlanta Contemporary Dance Company, The Puerto Rican Traveling Theatre, and The Alvin Ailey Repertory Ensemble. Mr. Barnes is a member of Actors Equity and has performed under the direction of Word Baker, Howard DaSilva, and Marshall Mason of the Circle Rep. He has designed lighting for dance and theatre, and has worked on several feature films as a recording engineer. His television audio credits include The Ricky Lake Show, The View, and Law and Order. He has most recently come to us from CNN. Roberts' greatest accomplishment thus far in life, he says is his son Ruben. "I am also very pleased to be a part of the theatre staff for the Performing and Fine Arts Department at York College".

Barbara Nickolich (Professor of Theatre) received her formal theatre training from Wheaton College, Northwestern University and New York University. In addition, she has been a student of Bobby Troka, voice coach, in New York City. She has appeared as a performer and director with the CUNY Readers Theatre. She developed a one-woman show, American Counterpoint, which she performed in Munich, Germany, Nashville and New York City. Most of her work has been as a director of legitimate theatre in university settings. Antigone, Tartuffe, Six Plays by Dario Fo, Callallo 7, The Miser, Camino Real, The Imaginary Invalid, Galileo, Callaloo 8, A Servant of Two Masters, Callaloo 9, Endgame, and Callaloo 10 have been her most recent productions.

No one who saw it ever forgot it: a woman with a broken mind taking the arm of the man who is to escort her to an asylum and saying with exquisite courtesy, "Whoever you are — I have always depended on the kindness of strangers."

The scene is from his most famous work, ("A Streetcar Named Desire,") but even the weakest of Tennessee Williams's plays contained such moments, moments that hushed the audience to pindrop concentration.

To name their titles ("The Glass Menagerie")...
... "The Rose Tattoo"... "Orpheus Descending"
... "Summer and Smoke"... "Cat on a Hot Tin
Roof")... "The Night of the Iguana"... "Camino
Real"... "Sweet Bird of Youth"... "The Milk
Train Doesn't Stop Here Anymore" — is to fill the
memory with a crowd of sad, funny, tough, fragile
people. To name their players — Laurette Taylor,
Maureen Stapleton, Anna Magnani, Margaret
Leighton, Marlon Brando, Vivien Leigh, Jessica
Tandy and many dazzling others — is to embark
upon an impressive roll call of great actors and
actresses.

Most of them are women, and for good reason. Though Mr. Williams created at least two great male characters — Big Daddy and Stanley Kowalski — it is his women who commanded his stage. Whatever they were like, they all had gallantry in common, that and some of the best lines any playwright ever gave an actress.

Tennessee Williams died this week at 71, and left many mourners: strangers who for 40 years depended on him for the most magical evenings in American theater.
