



NOTE: Although Speech Communication students may take as much Theatre Arts *practica* as they please, *no more than 6 credits of Theatre Arts practica* may be applied towards the fulfillment of the Speech Communication Concentration; however, Theatre Arts students *may apply 9 credits of Theatre Arts* Practica towards the fulfillment of the Theatre Arts Concentration. Theatre Arts *practica* courses currently include TA215-19.

*All SpeechComm/TA majors must take SPCH 101 as a Prereq for completion of the Major. Majors in Speech Communication/Theatre Arts must fulfill their General Education Requirements in a discipline other than their major.

The competitive drive and quest for success is still present at performing arts schools all over the country. They are private, public and charter schools and educate students in the classical arts, but also have modern offerings, such as hip-hop dance and pop vocals. Coursework aside, there is a stronger reason students are attracted to a performing arts school. They are all looking for a place where they can be really passionate about the arts as well as becoming a well-rounded person. Performing arts classes are so incredibly structured and formulated. They are also engaging and interesting because they connect you to your art. And isn't that the point of education and the arts?

While Fame may be the television and movie version of what happens in the halls and rehearsal rooms, it does show the true spirit of a performing arts high school--sweat and the work ethic. Fame captures that beautifully and we see that manifest itself in the students every single day at York who decide to tap into their creative side by taking part in a production, whether it be onstage or backstage. At first, they may see the celebrity, the flash, the glory and all of that. However, if they enter the Performing Arts Center with "the sweat and the work ethic" they need to possess, they come out appreciating the work they have put into a production and the skills that they have developed.

This struggle for self-identity within the performing arts is universal. As young adults all over the world begin to find their niche in society, the journey to define oneself and perfect ones craft becomes an important part of their daily routine. It is a competition between peers in an effort to strive for the best and come out on top. Though *Fame* is originally set in the early 1980's, the bittersweet but ultimately inspiring story of a diverse group of students as they commit to four years of grueling artistic and academic work, spans the decades. Even today, students go through the same situations and jump through the same hoops as students of the 1980's.

Updating *Fame* to fit into 2010 was a choice that appeared both logical and fitting. It was a decision that helped to reinforce the universality of the struggle for identity as an artist. In this attempt to update Fame, not only were the music and dance important focal points, but the environment and overall feeling of the show played major roles. When we look at today's musical, we are inundated with spectacle. Sets are elaborate, music and dance are modern and rock-like, costumes are realistic and video becomes another theatrical convention. These theatrical elements all help to create the "theatre experience", but in an age of Facebook, Twittering, texting and Youtube, the theatre experience must be even more magical to rouse the audience. Though our environment or set is sparse and suggestive, what should grab the audience is the contemporary connection, between the actor and the audience, to the world that our current students inhabit. The characters are truly reflections of the diverse talent that our students possess. This connection, I believe, it what makes our production of Fame magical.

With candor, humor and insight, *Fame* explores the universal issues that confront many young people today struggling for a place in the performing arts. It is this pursuit of individuality and self-worth as an artist that gives meaning and substance to the complex and delicate thing called the self. It is also a sobering thought that we who teach in the performing arts can have significant impact on how students will see themselves and their world, as well as formulate their identity through actions. As the lyrics go, "Two things make life worth living, 'to love and to work." In the performing arts, we have the privilege of working hard at something we love. 'The operative words being 'hard work."

ABOUT FAME THE MUSICAL

A stage musical based on the 1980 musical film *Fame* has been staged under two titles. The first, *Fame – The Musical* conceived and developed by David De Silva, is a musical with a book by Jose Fernandez, music by Steve Margoshes and lyrics by Jacques Levy. The musical premiered in 1988 in Miami, Florida. as *Fame on 42nd Street*, it was performed Off-Broadway from 2003 to 2004. De Silva had produced the 1980 film about students at New York City's High School of Performing Arts. The critically and commercially successful film was followed by a six-season television series, a reality television show and the musical. The musical is significantly rewritten from the previous adaptations, with an almost entirely new score. The film is referred to several times in the script and in two songs. Since its first production, *Fame – The Musical* has had numerous professional and amateur productions.

In 1988, Fame – the Musical was first produced at the Coconut Grove Playhouse in Miami, Florida. The original cast included Tom Acousti as Nick Piazza, Tener Brown as Iris Kelly, Monique Cintron as Carmen Diaz, Joel Malina as Schlomo Metzenbaum, Janet Metz as Serena Katz, and Harold Perrineau Jr. as Tyrone Jackson. It went back to its roots in 2010 with sold-out productions in Kendall, where the Miami Childrens Theater worked with the esteemed Christine Vega, Ana Flavia, and Cherilyn Marrocco on a production. Following this, the show ran at the Walnut Street Theatre in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania from March 25, through April 29, 1989; the show was termed "a hit". The show ran Off-Broadway at the Little Shubert Theatre from October 7, 2003 (previews), November 11, 2003 (official), through June 27, 2004, for 264 performances and 40 previews.

David De Silva (Concept and Development) is known as "Father Fame." He conceived, developed and produced the MGM motion picture Fame. The film received four Academy Award nominations. He was Consulting Producer on the television series which ran for six years on network television and in syndication, received numerous Emmy Awards, and has been seen in sixty-eight countries. Mr. De Silva believes that Fame will have its greatest success in the theatre. Its youth-oriented idealism and "live" performance energy will be an inspiration to young people everywhere.

José Fernandez (*Book*) began his theatrical career as an actor. On Broadway, *The Me Nobody Knows*, for which he received The Variety Critic's Poll Nomination for Best Actor, as well as *Hair*, *Truckload* and *Two Gentleman of Verona*. José's turns as a writer includes the Off-Broadway musical, *El Bravo!*, produced by Kenneth Waissman and has co-authored several comedies. In 1984, with David De Silva, he began the task of transforming *Fame* into a new and timeless musical. Born in Cuba and raised in New York City, he died at 46, but



ERIC METCALF (Assistant Professor of Rhetoric and Public Address) is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire (B.A.) and the University of Massachusetts at Amherst (M.A. and Ph.D.). Before joining the York College faculty he taught rhetorical studies at Weslevan College in Macon. Georgia, The College of Wooster in Wooster, Ohio, and the Borough of Manhattan Community College, CUNY. For several years he was employed by the photo services division of the Discovery television networks in Silver Spring, Maryland. He has studied primary campaigning in presidential elections and is currently conducting historical research in the technologies of popular performance in 19th century America. Dr. Metcalf is the newest member of the Performing & Fine Arts Department.



BARBARA NICKOLICH (Prof. Emerita of Theatre) received her formal theatre training from Wheaton College, Northwestern University and New York University. In addition, she has been a student of Bobby Troka, voice coach, in NYC. She has appeared as a performer and director with the CUNY Readers Theatre. She developed a one-woman show, American Counterpoint, which she performed in Munich, Germany, Nashville and New York City. Some of her past York productions include: Antigone, Tartuffe, Six Plays by Dario Fo. Callallo 7. The Miser, Galileo. Callaloo, A Servant of Two Masters, Endgame, The Glass Menagerie and Antigone.



DAVID T. JONES (Substitute Lecturer of Theatre/Resident Scenic Designer) is a resident of Brooklyn and a graduate of Pratt Institute. His most recent designs for York College Theatre were last season's Fabulation, Scapin, and The Tempest. He also designed the previous year's shows including Little Shop of Horrors, The Exonerated and Anna in the Tropics. Mr. Jones is the resident scenic designer for the Village Light Opera Group in Manhattan, for whom he has designed most of the Gilbert & Sullivan operas, musicals and operettas. Notable productions include Scrooge and Gilbert and Sullivan, Kismet, Bells Are Ringing, La Vie Parisienne, a storybook HMS Pinafore, an intergalactic Princess Ida. and The Merry Widow (co-designed with Timothy J. Amrhein). He also designs beyond NYC, his most recent production being *Urinetown* for Northern Highlands Regional High School. For NHRHS has also provided designs for *The Baker's* Wife and Beauty and the Beast, which garnered a scenic design nomination from Paper Mill playhouse.



TOM MARION (Substitute Assistant Prof. of Theatre) holds an M.F.A. in Acting from Rutgers' Mason Gross School of the Arts (with Bill Esper), a Certificate of Vocal Coaching from The National Theatre Conservatory (with Tony Church), and an internship with The Royal Shakespeare Company (with Cecily Berry and Andrew Wade.) He is a Designated Teacher of Linklater Voice, a founding member of the Linklater Center for Voice and Language, and an Associate Teacher of Fitzmaurice Voicework. He has taught at several studios and professional actor programs in NYC, including NYU, The Actors' Center, Marymount Manhattan College, The New School, and Columbia University. He is a member of Actors' Equity. At York Prof. Marion has directed Fabulation, The Exonerated, The Tempest, and was the creator/director of SPEAK OUT, which was subsequently performed at The Bowery Poetry Club in Manhattan and at York as part of Black History Month.

not before he saw *Fame* in Stockholm, in 1993. The theater filled with youngsters, many with their parents, Jose carefully observed the reactions, hushed gasps and teary eyes, thunderous applause and joyous laughter. He needed no further evidence; convinced of the impact the show would have on the world.

Jacques Levy (*Lyrics*) has written lyrics with and for many well-known recording artists. He wrote Bob Dylan's album *Desire* with Dylan, and it became one of Dylan's biggest-selling albums ever, with the single *Hurricane* released from it. Levy has written a half dozen albums with Roger McGuinn... for the Byrds, the Thunderbyrd Band, and McGuinn's solo works, including the hit single "Chestnut Mare." His lyrics have also been recorded by Carly Simon, Crystal Gayle, Joe Cocker and Jerry Lee Lewis. A member of the Dramatists Guild, Levy has written a considerable amount for the theatre, including five produced musicals, two of them, *Oh, Calcuttal* and *The Golden Land*, presented on the New York stage. Along the way, Levy's work has been honored with three Grammy nominations. He is currently head of the Theatre Program and Director of University Theatre at Colgate University. He lives in Hamilton, NY, with his wife and two children.

Steve Margoshes (*Music*), in collaboration with David De Silva, has composed, orchestrated and recorded new symphonic works for symphony orchestra under the banner, "SYMPHONIC FAME" (a double CD) and "SYMPHONIC FAME" for violin and orchestra. These recordings were made with the Budapest Symphony Orchestra with Laszlo Kovacs conducting and Barnabas Kelemen as virtuoso violinist. His newest recording is a CD, "Sawing to New Heights With Steve and Dale," a new work for saw and piano with Dale Stuckenbruck on saw and Steve on piano. As orchestrator, Steve's numerous credits include 6 Broadway shows: Elton John and Tim Rice's *Aida, The Who's Tommy, Big River*, (Tommy Tune's revival of) *Grease, Smoky Joe's Cafe* (The songs of Leiber and Stoller), and Jim Steinman and Roman Polanski's upcoming *Dance of the Vampires*. Steve won Drama Desk awards for his orchestrations of *Big River* and *Tommy*.

Language, Literature and Communication from Columbia University. In his forty-plus years at York, Dr. Como (among other service to the college) has chaired his department for fifteen years, been vicechair and parliamentarian of the Senate, and has chaired the Committee on Academic Standards and the Instruction Committee. He has been honored for his teaching at the College and continues to serve as coordinator of the Speech Discipline (which he founded in 1968 and has since directed) and as a mentor for The Male Initiative and Men's Center at York. Prof. Como's books are Why I Believe in Narnia: Thirty-three Reviews and Essays on the Life and Work of C. S. Lewis (2008, spanning his four decades as a Lewis scholar and critic), Remembering C.S. Lewis (1979, 1992, 2005), and Branches to Heaven (1998). He has also appeared as a commentator for a number of TV documentaries on Lewis. As a credentialed foreign correspondent Prof. Como covered the landmark Peruvian elections of 1990 ("Prolonging Peruvian Solitude," "The Hero Story-Teller: Mario Vargas Llosa and Peruvian Political Culture" for National Review); his work in rhetorical theory and criticism is evident in international conference papers ("Domain Theory," for the International Society for the History of Rhetoric meeting in Poland), in Proceedings ("Elitism at the Core: Dare We Call it Rhetoric?" the University of North Texas Press), and as journalism ("Debates, Debates and Showbiz," a cover-story for the National Review). Prof. Como has been a City

University of New York Chancellor's Access to Excellence honoree and a Salvatori Fellow with the Heritage Foundation.



TIM CORKERY (Lecturer of Speech Communication) earned his BA in Speech Communication from York College and his Master's in Social Work from Fordham University's Graduate School of Social Science. While studying at Fordham, he was the recipient of the United Settlement House Scholarship for his work in the area of community advocacy, and has been a consultant to various social service agencies, where he has used his knowledge of Rhetoric and Social Work to develop effective communitybased models of service. In his current work, he is advocating and developing programs in rehabilitative justice. His work is based on his study of Existential Psychotherapy, especially the work of Viktor Frankel's logotherapy. Aside from his work in clinical social work, he has been successful in the creation of two debate teams in NYC high schools and served as judge for national and international debate competitions.
