Some of his past directorial credits include: An Evening of Durang, Le Bourgeois Gentilhomme, Dreamgirls, La Luz De Un Cigarrillo, RENT, SlapDASH, All in the Timing, FAME the Musical, Yo Soy Latina, Scapin, Little Shop of Horrors, Anna in the Tropics, Oleanna, Into the Woods and Once Upon A Mattress. Mr. Amrhein has also designed both costumes and scenery throughout the United States. Some of his most recent designs have been No Exit, Galileo, Endgame, Charley's Aunt and Antigone (York College), the first New York City revival of *The Full Monty* and The Fantasticks (The Gallery Players) and Twelfth Night (Princeton Repertory Shakespeare Festival). Other design and directing credits include work for the Village Light Opera Group, the Princeton Repertory Shakespeare Festival, the River Rep Theatre Company, the Wings Theatre, The Second City (Detroit and Toronto), Carnegie Mellon University, and the California Repertory Theatre. He received the Best Scenic Design award from the NJ Star Ledger for The Merry Wives of Windsor, the Detroit Free Press's Theatre Excellence Award for Saturday, Sunday, Monday and Scapin and most recently the Award for Creative Excellence for his set design of *The Hedge* from the Arts in Christian Theatre. Prof. Amrhein has also translated the Dominican play, La Luz De Un Cigarrillo, by Marco Antonio Rodriguez from Spanish into English with the help of the cast. The English premier was performed in October of 2012 at York College. He is a member of United Scenic Artists, Local 829 and the United States Institute for Theatre Technology.

As Technical Director for Manoa Valley Theatre, Hawaii's premier off-Broadway playhouse, he received the award for "Outstanding Technical Direction" from the Hawaii State Theatre Council in 2010, a category created that year. He also received Po'okela Awards for his outstanding set designs for

Little Shop Of Horrors (2011), Sleuth (2010), Tuesdays with Morrie (2009) all at Manoa Valley Theatre. He was also awarded Broadwayworld.com Outstanding Lighting Design of a Play for Sight Unseen at Baltimore's Fells Point Corner Theatre in 2006. His passion lies in helping theatre artists realize their vision and making it possible for audiences to be emotionally and intellectually transported.

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

There are two things that usually define living in New York City. The first of those is 'opportunity'. Yes. It is an overused phrase. But it is true. Any theatre artist here, for example, can attest to the fact that we are all a short subway ride from working with some of the most inspiring talents today. Every day. Now this subway ride might be an hour trip on the E train to Jamaica Center...well.... but it can also be three stops to Midtown.

I met Rob Ackerman at The Lark Play Development Center, which I am confident to say is one of the most important engines for artistic creation in theatre in New York City. Rob would bring in pieces of his new play, *Teach for America*, which he was developing for its first production at the American Conservatory Theatre's MFA and Young Conservatory Actors program (directed by W. David Keith and produced by Craig Slaight and Melissa Smith) in San Francisco, and actors, including myself at the Lark, would get up on our feet and do them; no context, no preparation.

When professor Tom Marion generously asked me to direct this fall's main production, I immediately knew it was going to be this play. No hesitation. I knew we could give it life here at York. So I wrote Rob and laid it all out. And it worked out. He said yes.

Now that I know Rob more, I am even more grateful for this opportunity than I was at the beginning, because only now do I really understand how much Rob loves his work, his plays, and his characters. And we get to do it all.

Now, the other thing that usually defines living in New York City, experientially, is this element of 'surprise'. For me, this surprise has been teaching here at York. It combines all the vibrant things that make it exciting to do plays. It just makes sense.

There is something special about working with actors here. To say it crudely, it is a process that is devoid of all the uninspiring preciousness that accompanies making theatre sometimes; that sense of unnecessary über-artistic ownership. In the theatre, as everyone

knows, we usually try so hard to transform fiction into reality. Working with these wonderful actors is quite the opposite: they make reality into fiction. And if that is not theatre, what is? But that is not what I primarily like about Bukola and Uchenna and Kevin and Mariel and Arline and Yasha and Katrina and Sabrina and Shakeerah and Matthew, and of course the generous Michael, who is an actor and a faculty member here. What I love about them is that they are fierce. Because they are intuitive. Because they are never trying to be artistic. They *are* artistic. And that's because they have an authentic voice. They will not do anything they don't believe in. They know the world.

What I also believe has been special about this production of *Teach for America* is the fact that it's a play about public education... at a public educational institution. It is a play about the 'now' and the 'here', which has made it immediate, urgent, and resonant for all of us, and hopefully for our audiences. Educational disparity, bureaucratic pressures, and petrified standardized methods are paramount problems of the future. They are the ingredients of mediocrity. And the eternal conflict of navigating the line between that which is 'right' and that which we have created to be 'the norm' is heartbreaking, especially in the classroom. The thing about bad systems is that they are terrible because they work. It is terrifying.

Theatres and theatre makers, ad nauseam, talk about building new audiences. This, most of the time, translates into offering discounted tickets and distributing pamphlets to hang on bulletin boards and community centers in the so-called outer boroughs. But we all know that this builds nothing but more paper to recycle. I firmly believe that we *are* building new audiences here at York. We *are* creating relevant new work *with* hidden talents *for* communities that transcend the theatre-going scene, both culturally and geographically. And the challenges are immense. To quote the play: *The world is not fair, so we need to make it fair.* And that's art.
