## **Planning Your Introduction**

Every writing assignment needs an introductory paragraph. Here are some pointers for planning your introduction.

Your introduction needs to answer several basic questions:

- 1. What are you writing about?
  Tell the reader what your general topic is.
- 2. Why are you writing about it?
  Tell the reader your purpose in writing the paper.
- 3. What's your thesis?
  Provide your reader with a concise statement of your main contention. A good thesis is *controversial*. That means it is a statement that somebody might disagree with.
- 4. What's coming up?

  Lay out the overall plan of your paper for the reader.

## Example of an introductory paragraph:

This essay is about the emission of greenhouse gases. My objective is to explore policy options and argue in favor of a cap and trade system for controlling emissions. My thesis is that a cap and trade system is the best policy option because it addresses the needs of both environmentalists and free marketeers. On the following pages, I will define the problem of greenhouse gas emissions, list the major alternatives for reducing them, and explain why a cap and trade system is the best choice for the United States.
